PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Colleagues,

When I wrote last in March I talked of catalysts. So catalytically I am about to go to Cork and later this month to Edinburgh. Cork on 16-17 June is the third annual meeting of workshops on the European Landscape Convention. There we will hear something of the results of the Dutch meeting on 9 June about the European Landscape Convention led by Rijkslandschapsarchitect Dirk Sijmons (how's that a position: every country should have a state landscape architect). For a long time, Holland was one of the three major countries (with Germany and the UK), which did not sign this Convention. Now the Dutch have decided to ratify and sign it!

This is something we also hope to hear about in Edinburgh at the end of the month where the IFLA World Congress takes place. Martha Fajardo, President of IFLA attended our seminar on the Convention last November and immediately proposed a World Landscape Convention. So EFLA can act as a wider catalyst.

One place we did not go to was the meeting of Bologna Declaration countries, which is another wider definition of Europe. The 45 ministers of Education of the signature countries met in Bergen on 19-20 June to push forward the Bologna process in university education. Bachelors and Masters and ECTS and the ideal of the European wandering scholar were the

theme and agreed that the next meeting would be in London in 2007. So what is the point of all this. Well the point is that it gives people opportunities; it allows students to move from university to university across Europe and also to gain recognition for their education in other countries. We are working on a draft on the Common Education Platform for landscape architects, which national associations have now all received, we await comments.

Opportunity is what we should be about, pursuing opportunities as they arise. And in that respect we should welcome the achievement of our colleagues at ECLAS, the European educationalists have stood on their own feet and with EU funding have set up the Le: Notre network as a basis for amplifying ECLAS and that too should be celebrated. This is also an example of the wider Europe working embracing Moscow and Turkey. Indeed some would say that Le:Notre Meister Richard Stiles has world wide ambitions. And why not, given the ambition of this is to build networks, to foster communication across countries and between those interested in landscape not about narrow concerns?

Fostering opportunity is what we are about: creating dialogues, about promoting our profession and our concern, which is the landscape.

EU RELATIONS

BDLA.BSLA/PHALA/IFLA/ EFLA MONITORING PROJECT

Decisions on EU funding policy are expected in June and the Monitoring Group will then pursue its contact with the Directorate Generals for the Regions and the Environment. The Urban thematic strategy is being reviewed again this year and this will be raised with DG Environment. The three month rolling programme has been reviewed and of note is the schedule for Commission action over the coming six months which includes the following:

- Council decision on the rural development strategy for 2007-2010
 - Thematic Strategy for marine conservation and environmental protection
 - Thematic Strategy for soil
 - Proposal for a directive on Payment Services in the Single Market,
 - Proposal for a Council decision on strategy for cohesion policy (which directs EU funding to poorer regions),
 - Proposal for a decision of Council on the signature of the Alpine Convention on soil protection, energy and tourism
 - Proposal for a directive on environmental quality standards and on water pollution control relative to directives 2000/60/CE and 96/641/CE
 - Thematic Strategy for the sustainable utilization of natural resources
 - Thematic Strategy for the Urban Environment
- The BDLA have organised a day's seminar on the subject of European monitoring on 1 June in Würzburg and there is also to be a presentation at the IFLA World Congress in Edinburgh at the end of June. Meanwhile the interim report is being placed on the www.efla.org website.

Currently this project is funded for the three year period 2003-5 and further funding is sought from both international and national associations for this project. (*Mario Kahl*)

COUNCIL OF EUROPE

WARSAW SUMMIT ACTION PLAN INCLUDES LANDSCAPE

The Warsaw Summit of the Council of Europe Heads of State on 16 and 17 May agreed an Action Plan, which included the following commitment under point II 7 and which refers in particular to spatial planning and landscape. It also refers to natural and cultural heritage and culture. "Promoting sustainable development We are committed to improving the quality of life for citizens. The Council of Europe shall therefore, on the basis of the existing instruments, further

develop and support integrated policies in the fields of environment, landscape, spatial planning and prevention and management of natural disasters, in a sustainable development perspective." (Action Plan point 11 item 7)

This is highly significant for the landscape and is an early example of an international commitment, which affects policies on national territories. EUROPEAN LANDSCAPE CONVENTION

Seventeen countries have now ratified then Convention and 30 signed it. Notable last year was the signing by the Ukraine. As per the 10th June 2005 the Netherlands have decided to sign and ratify it, after being delayed by troubles with the EU Habitat and Birds Directives.

According to the Ministry LNV, the Dutch landscape policy is fully in line with the ELC as 25% of the country is considered as "landscape of national importance". At the conference "Landscape, the trump card of Europe" organised by the Government Advisor on Landscape a manifesto from 25 Dutch NGO's and developers was presented. They ask the government to pay more attention to landscape in spatial planning policies and think a lot more has to be done to retain landscape quality in major projects at hand.

PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

COMMON EDUCATION PLATFORM AND THE EU PROFESSIONS DIRECTIVE

The directive passed its second reading in the European Parliament on 11 May 2005 and adopted the Council's recommendations also of May. The new Directive (reference 2002/0061(COD)) supersedes the fifteen existing directives including the General System Directive, which covers us and creates one new framework directive.

For landscape architects the special attraction of this directive proposal is the Common Education Platform proposed for each General System profession (that includes us). The new mechanism will consist of the establishment of an Expert Group that will advise the regulatory committee that will manage the implementation of the directive. EFLA is working on such a Common Education Platform providing it meets the representative conditions of the directive when passed. However, it has to represent 3/4 of the countries and all the countries, which have "regulated" professions which is presumably the countries where landscape architecture is a registered profession (Germany, Czech Republic, Hungary, The Netherlands, Austria and Italy: currently the Austrian, Czech and Hungarian associations are not members of EFLA).

EDUCATION

BOLOGNA MINISTERIAL MEETING 2005

Ministers for higher education for higher education from 45 countries met in Bergen 19-20 May 2005 to review progress of the Bologna. New countries were Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Moldova, and the Ukraine. Full papers with all the national reports are on the website below.

Overall there has been substantial progress. In most countries more than half of the students are enrolled in the two-cycle degree systems. Almost all member states have made provisions for quality assurance systems, but still progress, particular in student involvement, can be made. 36 of 45 countries have ratified the Lisbon Recognition Convention, committing to principles of recognition of degrees and study periods.

Issues being pushed included quality assurance, mutual recognition in connection with the Lisbon Recognition Convention, a focus on doctoral

EUROPA NOSTRA: BERGEN DECLARATION ON EUROPEAN COASTS

The Hague, 14 June 2005: Europa Nostra – the Pan-European Federation for Cultural Heritage of over 200 heritage NGOs – during its recent Congress in Bergen (Norway) adopted a "Declaration on Safeguarding Coastal Culture" calling upon European Governments and civil society to pay greater attention to the protection of cultural heritage when developing conservation and sustainable development schemes in coastal areas.

The Declaration was endorsed by the participants in the Forum titled "Safeguarding Coastal Culture" organised as part of the Europa Nostra Congress that brought together 180 delegates from 27 European countries. Speakers of the Forum included representatives from EUCC the Coastal Union, the National Trust for England, Wales and Northern Ireland, the Heathland Centre in Norway and the European Sea Level Service.

The Bergen Declaration acknowledged the substantial advances that had been made in coastal conservation since Europa Nostra adopted its Istanbul Declaration on Saving Europe's Coastlines in 1992. In particular, Europa Nostra recognised the Integrated Coastal Zone Management (ICZM) Programme of the European Commission, but highlighted that the interests of conservation of coastal cultural heritage should be further integrated into the programme implementation.

Europa Nostra welcomed the European Landscape Convention adopted regarding coastal and maritime landscapes which need a high level of protection. Regretting that many European countries did not yet sign or ratify this Convention, Europa Nostra encouraged their Governments to sign.

EU COUNCIL OF MINISTERS BRUSSELS 16-17 JUNE 2005

The mid June Brussels meeting was dominated by the aftermath of the French and Dutch referenda on the European constitution and the linked arguments about the EU budget for the period 2008-2013. So it is easy to forget there were a number of successful decisions affecting landscape and also developing country aid, which are worth nothing (particular thinking of the IFLA and G8 meetings in Edinburgh in June):

Sustainable Development

The European Council restated its attachment to sustainable development as a key principle governing all the Union's policies and activities and it approved the Declaration on the guiding principles for sustainable development with a strategy to be adopted by the end of 2005

Overseas Development Aid

The Council decided on a new collective European Union target of an ODA/GNI ratio of 0,56% by 2010. That would result in an additional €20 billion a year in ODA.

Commitment to Africa

The EU considers the development of Africa a priority and will step up its efforts to assist African countries to reach the Millennium Development Goals. The European Council reaffirmed the EU's intention of increasing its financial assistance for sub-Saharan Africa by collectively allocating at least 50% of the agreed increase in ODA resources to the African continent

Proposal for a UN Environment Agency

Sustainable development, including environmental questions and concerns, must be integrated to a greater extent in national and international development programmes and strategies. The EU proposes that the high-level meeting in September 2005 initiate a process, as part of UN reform, which will lead to negotiations on the establishment of a UN agency for the environment, based on UNEP, with a revised and strengthened mandate, supported by stable, adequate and predictable financial contributions and operating on an equal footing with other UN specialised agencies. This agency, based in Nairobi, would make it possible to develop the environmental dimension of sustainable development in an integrated and consistent manner,

Relations with the ACP

The European Council welcomed the conclusion of the negotiations on the revision of the Cotonou Agreement, and the agreement reached on this subject with the ACP States on 23 February 2005. This revised agreement, while maintaining the Cotonou acquis, represents an improvement of the partnership between the ACP States, the Community and its Member States, in all its component parts.

"Green diplomacy" initiative

The European Council also took note of the report on the results obtained by the "Green diplomacy" initiative (launched in June 2003). In this connection, it welcomes the ongoing efforts to achieve better integration of environmental and sustainable development matters in external relations. 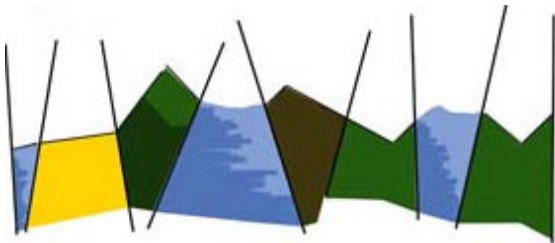
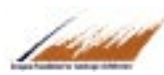

BLAUWE KAMER

Another trip to this hive of landscape publishing in a small town on the Neder Rijn (Lower Rhine). Established by Harry Harsema in Wageningen this is a place where landscape architects publish landscape architecture in as way which enhances to complement the Landscape Architecture Department of Wageningen University. Just west of Arnhem is not an obvious place for a centre of European-wide landscape and planning publishing. Well established on the Dutch market, Blauwe Kamer (or "Blue Room" after a nature reserve) in the NVTL Yearbook and the eponymous magazine and is producing a range of landscape and planning books and journals. Noteworthy this year are Duurzame Stedenbouw / Sustainable Urban Design (sadly only in Dutch) and Professor Jusuck Koh's inaugural lecture (of November 2004) Ecological Reasoning and Architecture Imagination (which is in both English and Dutch) and are doing the book production for the Landscape Architecture Foundation - EFLA called Landscape Architecture Europe, this new triennial review comes out at the end of the year. CORRECTION

HUNGARIAN LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE

There were errors in our report in the March Newsletter about the Corvinus University of Budapest in particular:

- The university website is www.uni-corvinus.hu/tajkar and has a full section in English on the Faculty of Landscape Architecture.
- Dean of the Faculty of Landscape Architecture: the faculty is headed by Professor Imre Jámbor. Professor Kinga Szilágyi is an associate dean of the faculty and is responsible for educational matters, and the Le:Notre and ECLAS affairs.
- It was Professor Imre Ormos who made efforts to develop the independent university level of landscape design education, and Professor Mihály Mőcsényi who, in 1963, widened the field of education by involving landscape planning in the programme.
- It is worth saying that there is a significant development of European doctoral level studies as well as the undergraduate and Masters level courses described.
- The membership of Hungarian Chamber of Architects (www.mek.hu) was correctly described, but the registration criteria require clarification. For landscape architects (and architects) to become members of the Chamber of Architects, and with it the legal right for landscape architects to practice landscape design and planning, requires a five year university Diplom, plus two years of professional practice. The limit of two ha is valid for this first level right to practice (termed K2). After five years of practice experience, landscape architects (and architects) may attain the higher level of design and planning permission, termed K1, which gives the right for landscape architects to design and supervise all sorts of landscape design and planning projects with no area limit. 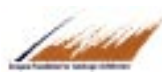
NEW ICELANDIC ASSOCIATION OFFICERS

HELSINKI PARK LANDSCAPE COMPETITION

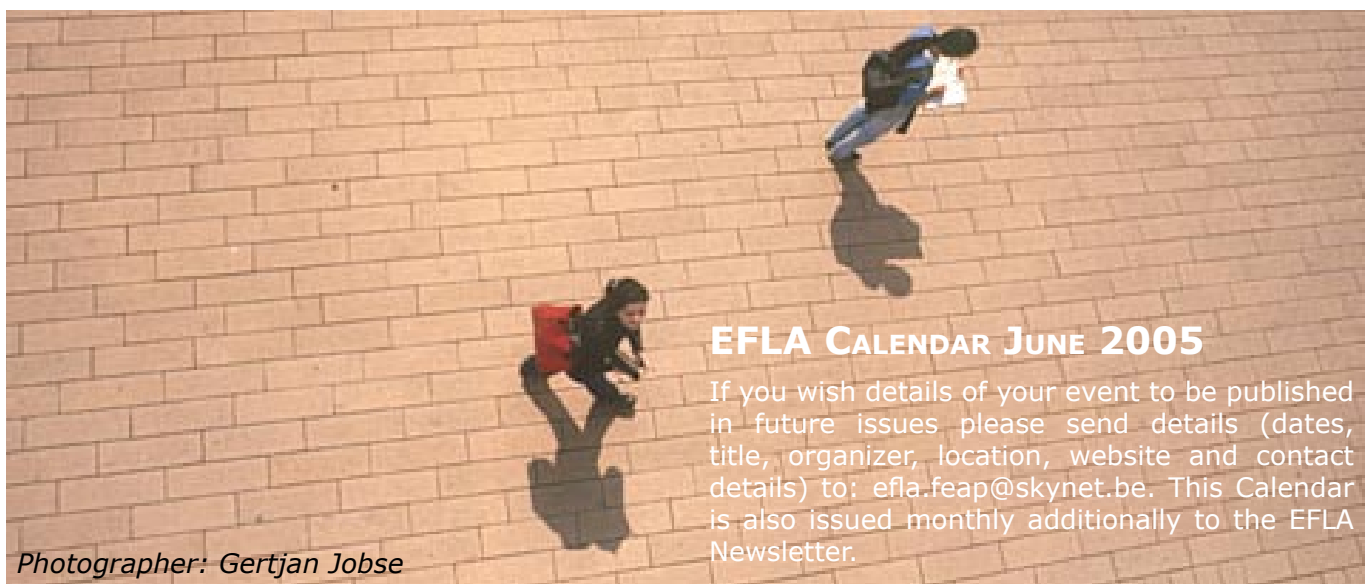
The City of Helsinki landscape architecture competition is for Länsisatamanpuisto Park (West Harbour Park) and organised with the Finnish Association of Landscape Architects MARK. The competition aims to find a feasible design concept with fresh ideas to serve as the point of departure for the detailed planning and further design of Länsisatamanpuisto Park. It is a general design competition open to professionals within the EU area.

The competition area forms part of the Jätkäsaari local plan area, which is predominantly earth fill, and will be free for residential, office and environmental construction in 2008, when the Port of Helsinki's cargo operations currently occupying the area are relocated in Vuosaari. The 10.5 ha site links the residential areas of Ruoholahti to the waterfront at the southern end of the district

Because most of the area is currently asphalt, a new landscape will have to be created for the entire park. The aim is to develop Länsisatamanpuisto Park into a high-quality and functionally diverse park with artistic elements. The park will not only be a functional park for residents, but also a coherent work of art visually.

The competition begins on 20 June 2005 and the competition deadline is 30 September 2005.

The competition is scheduled to be decided by the end of January 2006. Briefing documents will be available online after 20 June. The competition results will be announced by the end of January 2006.
